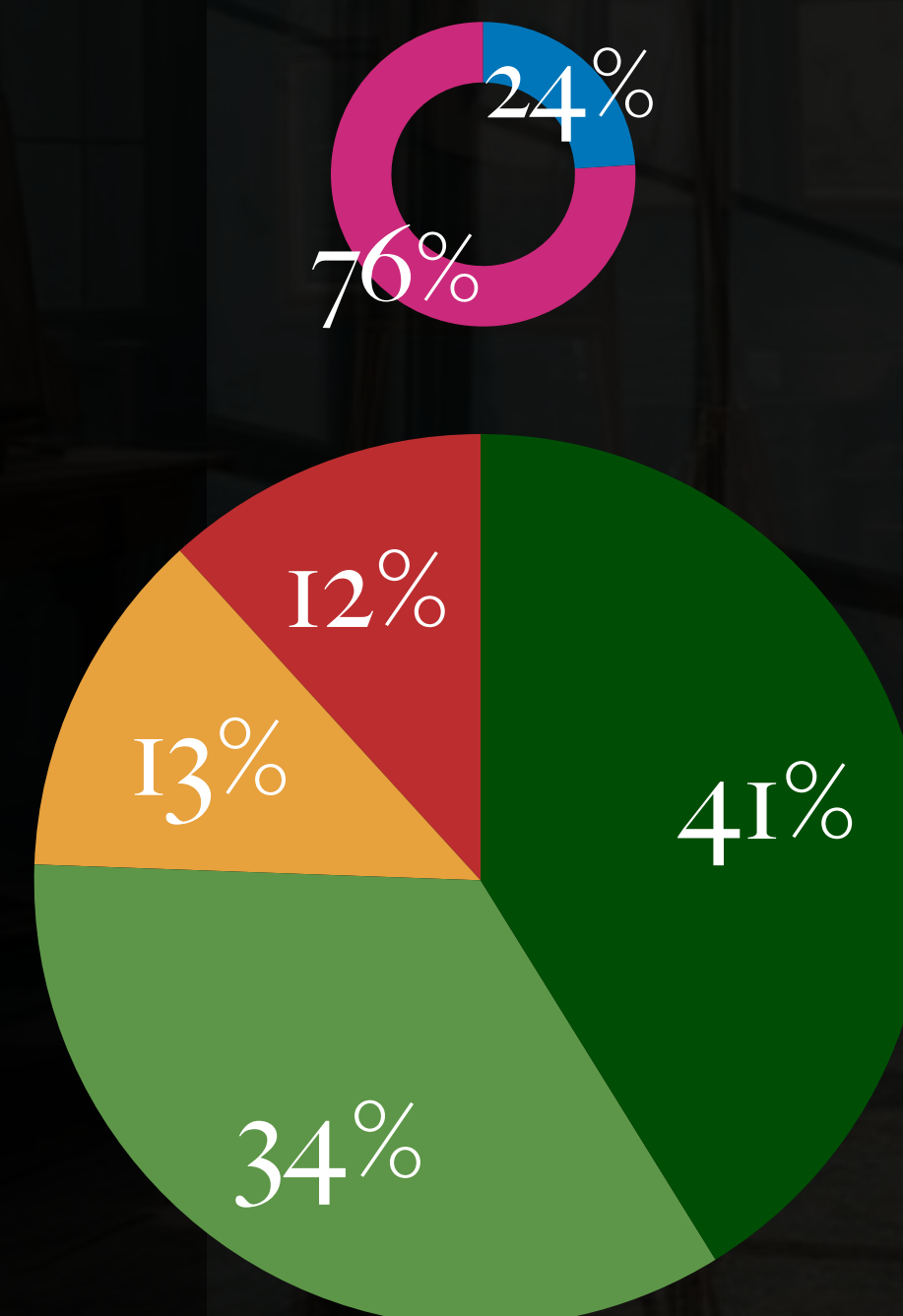

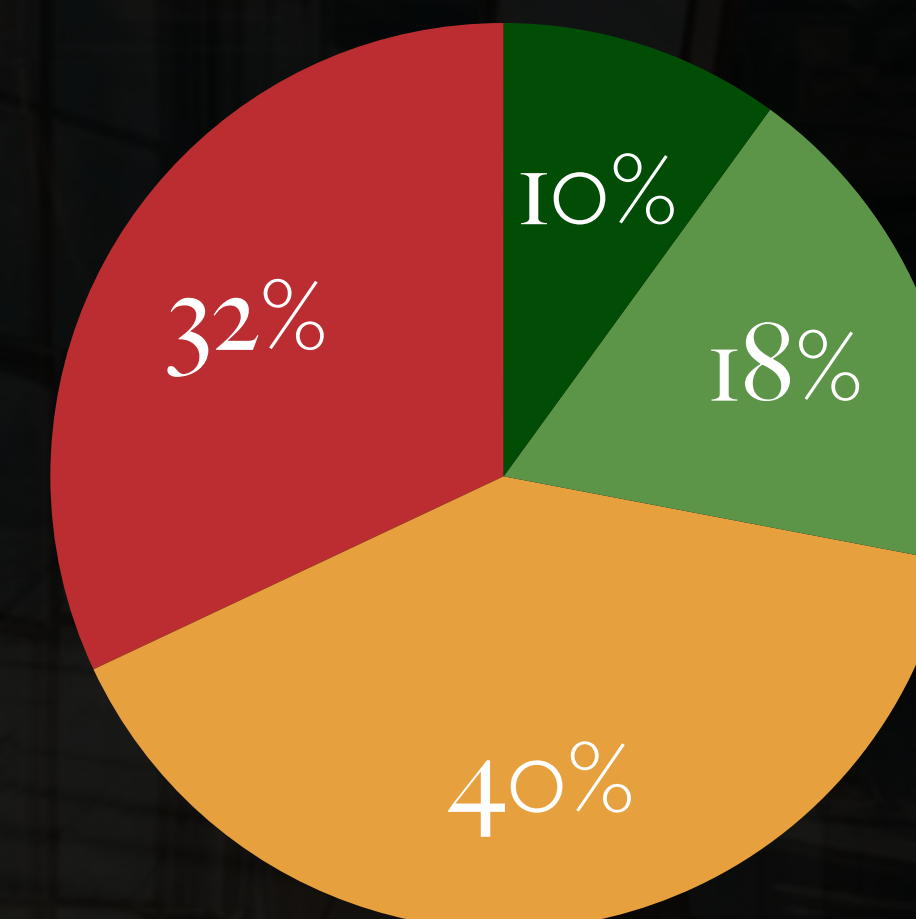
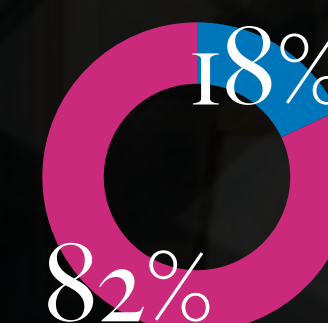


Audience by Gender

● Women

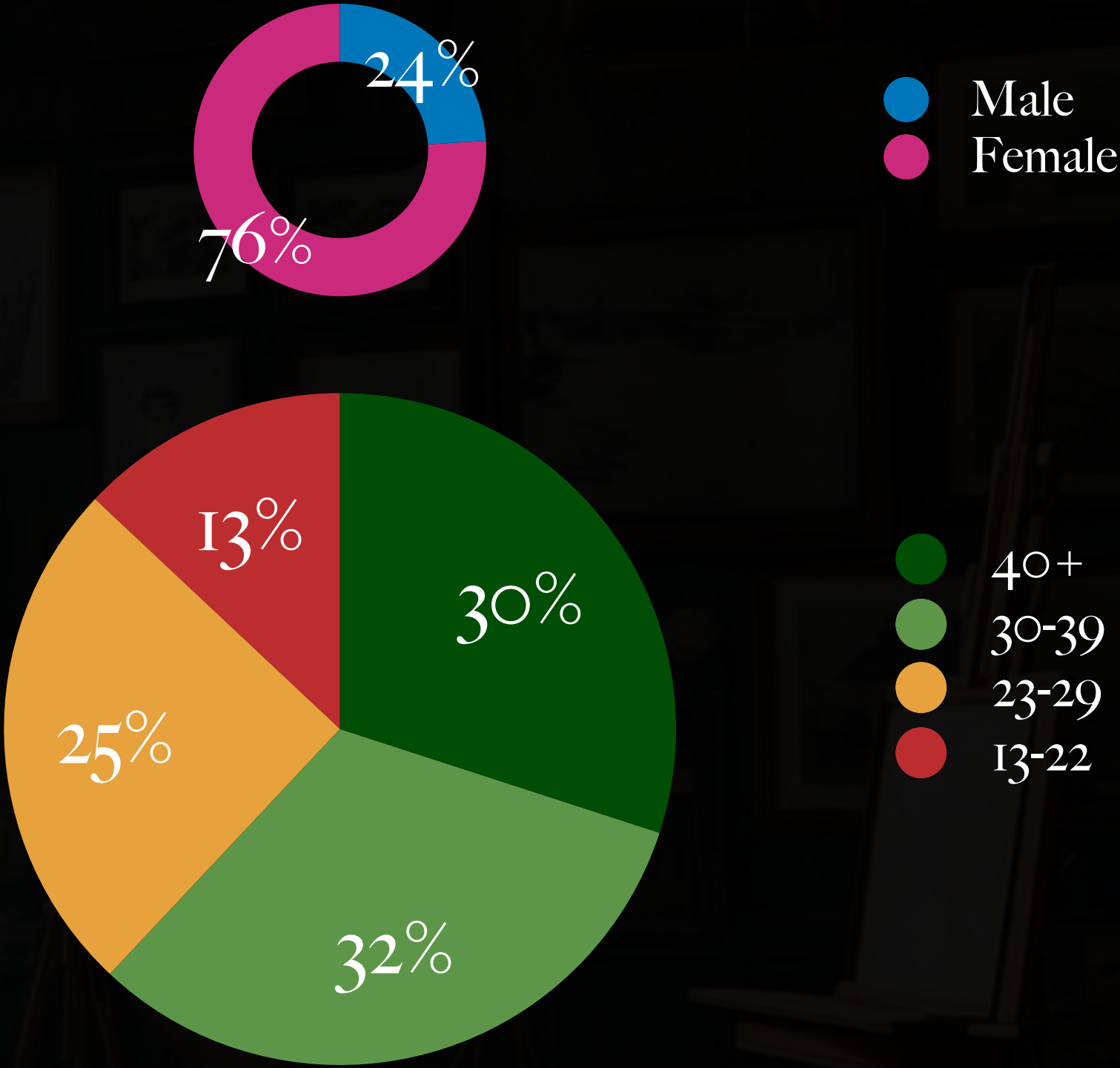
Audience by Age

## FROM DOCTOR AND PATIENT TO FRIENDS

Thrown together by circumstance, Sarah treats Lizzie's wounds and stands up for her when her grandfather thinks she has hysteria. They discover a shared interest in chemistry and build trust as they work together.

## TESTED BY WAR & GRIEF

Sarah and Lizzie are each tested by war and grief. Separated, they communicate through letters, their friendship deepened by shared sacrifice. When the war ends, Reconstruction brings new challenges. Back in Washington full time, they begin working together again.

## COMPATRIOTS

Sarah and Lizzie fight to stop Anthony Comstock from destroying all they've built.



## Anthony Comstock



We meet Anthony, for whom the Comstock Act was named as a young religious zealot who secretly harbors a chronic masturbation habit. After the Civil War, Anthony co-founds the Society for the Suppression of Vice in New York, and begins targeting publishers of erotica.



## Reverend John Hayden



Sarah's husband John is a devout minister, and conductor on the Underground Railroad. Together with Sarah and his sister, he leads a group of dedicated activists.





## Peter Sullivan



"Sully" is a beloved actor and local celebrity. He is a hedonistic attention seeker, but also a true and loyal friend.

## Jack Stephenson



Lizzie's partner, Jack is a businessman who runs the city's largest photo studio along with multiple side hustles.

Sully and Jack fall for each other the first time they meet, and remain together for the rest of their lives.

Sarah's oldest friend, Charity is a fourth generation midwife. She is confident and social, with a wicked sense of humor.

Lizzie's dear friend Teresa, the young wife of an influential Congressman, is classically educated, elegant, and a reckless narcissist having a scandalous affair





Episode One **A Fearful Storm**



Grief stricken Lizzie clashes with her grandfather who disapproves of her photography and new friends.  
Sarah falls in love and balances work as a midwife with radical activism at the church.



Lizzie and Sarah build trust as they go from doctor and patient, to friends.





In early episodes, the Dred Scott decision is announced and bounty hunters flood the city, so Sarah and John enlist the DC midwives to get undocumented people out. Lizzie leads a double life, becoming a prominent socialite while secretly making and selling erotic images. As their friendship deepens, Sarah gives Lizzie contraception, and medical advice without judgment, and Lizzie funds the construction of a new basement hideaway in Dr. Randolph's clinic.



When the Civil War starts, everything changes. Grown-up Comstock tries to reform his fellow soldiers in occupied Florida. Sarah works in the Freedman's hospital, secretly distributing birth control pamphlets, and Lizzie disguises herself as a man to join a ring of union spies.





During Reconstruction, Lizzie and Sarah get involved in the suffrage movement. Sarah opens her own successful clinic, and collaborates with Lizzie on a Women's anatomy textbook. They illustrate it with photographs.



But all the while, Comstock grows more powerful. He comes to DC, arrests Lizzie, burns all her negatives, tries to destroy Sarah's clinic and ban her textbook.



## Creative Team



NANCY OSTERTAG

"I am an army brat, and Vanessa is a firehouse kid. Because we both grew up in communities that centered around service, we share certain core values and experiences that have guided us as we've developed this story."

Nancy is a writer and photographer in New York who grew up with cameras as an integral part of her family culture. "If photography is a language, I'm a native speaker." Nancy started her career as an intern for Annie Leibovitz after studying Philosophy at Rutgers. "I had no experience. I walked into her studio with a blank resume and asked for a job." In the mid-nineties, Nancy followed another passion and moved to Los Angeles to work in the film industry. "I was one of those kids who watched my favorite movies repeatedly and could quote every line." She started shooting stills for Roger Corman productions, falling in love with the process of filmmaking. Nancy later worked as the photo archivist and staff photographer for the American Film Institute. "For seven years, I was immersed in a world of storytellers." It was at AFI that Nancy began collaborating with filmmaker Vanessa Ruane. Now on the East Coast, Nancy has spent the last fifteen years working for The Travel Channel, Discovery, and National Geographic. She is currently the photo editor for NatGeo's partner, Lindblad Expeditions.



VANESSA RUANE

"I believe in the power of storytelling to effect real change, and I know this is an important story to share."

My love of storytelling started with writing and acting. It eventually began to involve camera work, directing, and editing. As a child, I was an actress in NYC. I then traveled through Europe, writing and teaching English. In 1997, I moved to Los Angeles and began working as Writer/Producer Glen Larson's assistant. It was exciting to learn the writer's room and the pitching process. I spent six years traveling and learning directing while assisting Director John Badham. During those years, I also worked part-time as a photographer/videographer for the American Film Institute. Those years were full of learning, experimenting, and inspiration. In the early 2000s, I started making my own films and web series. I joined the Motion Picture Editors Guild and have worked in post-production for the last 15 years. In 2020, my work with Nancy Ostertag on Radicals was beginning to take shape, making me want to tell more of my own stories. We began writing and shooting short content, most recently collaborating in the Arctic and New Zealand for Lindblad/National Geographic Expeditions. I recently wrapped up my sixth season with the FX series Snowfall. Since then I've edited two features, one of which is streaming on Disney + and the other was at Tribeca this past summer.
